FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL



SAIS ACCREDITATION REPORT

Our accreditation visit concluded yesterday with some wonderful words of encouragement from the accreditation team. I am grateful for the time that these peer administrators from five SAIS schools gave to us in visiting and reviewing Mead Hall. I am also thankful to all those in our school community who gave their time and effort to make this visit.

In their oral report to the trustees and administration yesterday, the team highlighted that we live our identity as an Episcopal school stronger than the team chair had ever seen by welcoming all of the students and families and ensuring that they feel at home. In fact, "home" and "family" were words used by all the stakeholders with which the team spoke students, parents, administration, faculty, trustees, and alumni. I am grateful that members of our school community feel that we live the Christian virtue of hospitality and seek to ensure that everyone feels a sense of belonging.

The team also noted that the various constituency groups speak with one voice about the mission and identity of Mead Hall as well as hopes for the school's future. The chair noted that we have been through a lot of change and challenges in recent years, with the merger 11 years ago, a new head of school 4 years ago, a new rector who has just begun his ministry, Covid, and several administrative and faculty changes. However, having managed this change so well, the chair noted that we are "batting 1000" and ready to look forward to an exciting future because we have "all the pieces in place to move forward." The team saw that with a facilities plan and financial support, the campuses can be improved dramatically. The team appreciated both the history on our walls and the hopes for our future.

The business manager that was on the team noted that we are we offering an amazing education for less "than any other school with a similar caliber." It is wonderful to hear that we offer so much as a school with a tuition that is much lower than other independent schools, and I know that it takes a great deal of work from our teachers, staff, and administration to make this possible. The team noted that our faculty salaries are lower than those in the public schools and are glad that we have included the raising of compensation in our strategic plan. They said that "love goes a long way", as they concluded that this is how we make all this happen. I appreciate their words. The oral report concluded with glowing comments to our teachers about their teaching and their vital role in the lives of their students.

We will receive a full report from the team in a few weeks that will help give us direction as we move forward into our next five years.


Spooky Stories with 3rd Grade

On All Hallows Eve, Mrs. Water's second grade students participated in a Mexican tradition of creating art with flower petals on the graves of loved ones.






