FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

This week I had the opportunity to share the message at our Wednesday chapels to 1st-4th grades and 5th-8th grades. Our upper school has spent Wednesday through Friday this week in North Carolina for their annual community building trip, "Mountain Madness", so they had their chapel up in the mountains, led by our chaplain, Father Joseph.

My text was Jeremiah 1:4-10, where the Prophet Jeremiah reflects on God's call to him as a prophet, where God tells him, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations." This lesson recaptured my message to the students at opening ceremonies - God made them, God knows them, God loves them, and God has given each of them a purpose to do good things in the world.

I went on to tell the students that each of them can be a prophet just by seeing clearly and speaking truth about what they see about the present and what could happen in the future should certain decisions be made – one example I used to illustrate this is a group of friends who are all saying they should do something that is dangerous or wrong until the one prophetic voice speaks up to say, "This really isn't a good idea." I emphasized that every one of them can be a prophetic voice in this way or countless other ways just by speaking up, and that like Jeremiah, they cannot use the excuse that they are "too young" to speak up like a prophet. I also admitted to them that it is not easy to be a prophet because people might not like what they are saying, and that Jeremiah was not always appreciated for being a prophet. However, I added that if we are speaking truthfully and without selfish motives, it is the right thing to do, and it will make a difference among our friends, in our classrooms, and in the world, as well as bring us joy and satisfaction.

It is truly challenging to speak with a prophetic voice, but what a difference the voice of the prophet makes, both in scripture and in our own lives. Therefore, I challenged the students to be prophets this year and always.






Sabbatical for Father Joseph Whitehurst

On Labor Day weekend, Father Joseph will begin his clergy sabbatical. He will not return to Mead Hall until after the Christmas holidays. Fr. Joseph has served St. Thaddeus Church faithfully as curate, then as assistant rector and school chaplain, and currently as associate rector and chaplain and director of spiritual life for more than eighteen years. Ordinarily, clergy are afforded a sabbatical every 5-7 years. This will be Fr. Joseph's first sabbatical, so it is both well-deserved and long-overdue.

During his sabbatical time, Father Joseph will not have any pastoral, administrative, or teaching responsibilities at St. Thaddeus or Mead Hall. In order to preserve this intentional time of sabbath rest and restoration, he will also not be returning phone and email messages related to his pastoral and administrative duties at the parish and school. Father Joseph will be with us next Wednesday for school chapels and we will send him forth with God's blessing.



Fr. Joseph spent time in reflection and prayer in discerning his sabbatical plans. He writes, "The theme I have chosen for my sabbatical is "back to my roots"—both a literal and metaphorical exploration of them. Because I find time in nature to be life-giving, I will spend time reconnecting with my local roots here in South Carolina by exploring our state parks, with the goal of visiting all of them by the end of 2026. I'll also be hiking the West Highland Way in Scotland (I have Scottish ancestors on both sides of my family tree). On a day-to-day basis, I have many reading projects lined up; I'll be tackling N.T. Wright's multi- volume Christian Origins and the Question of God first! I also hope to get a dog and housebreak her over these next few months. In short, I'll be spending time pursuing renewal and reconnection. I look forward to rejoining everyone at Christmas!"

We wish Fr. Joseph every blessing as he begins his sabbatical!


Mrs. Water's fourth grade students had fun while learning about place value through a dice game in math, and in science students worked together to test the physical properties of soil.
